# ABOUT

Writes of Spring is a unique writing competition that encourages students to enhance their writing skills through creative expression. Each year, Orlando REP accepts hundreds of student submissions from Kindergarten through 12th grade. Excerpts from the winning entries are compiled to create an original play using the students' original words and ideas. The final script is fully produced by Orlando REP and UCF graduate students and presented onstage at Orlando REP in the Spring.

Submissions may be up to one full page. Students are encouraged to explore any and all styles of writing, be it a short story, poetry, essay, or any other format they see fit. Entries may be fiction or nonfiction.

#### **EXPLORING THE PROMPT**

These are suggestions on how to approach and discuss this year's prompt with your students. We encourage you to use these questions as a starting point for classroom activities and conversations that meet your personal curriculum.

1) What would be in your time capsule?

"Preserve your memories, keep them well, what you forget you can never retell"

Similar to boxes of buried treasure, time capsules have been used throughout time to preserve memories for people in the future. You can find things like photographs, knick-knacks, and special mementos that reflect what folks believe is important about their history. What do you want people in the future to know about you or society today?

2) If you were to write a letter to your future self what would it be?
What would you want to remember? What advice do you have for
your future self?

3) If you were to design a new future, what would it look like?

In theater productions, movies, and video games, designers get to imagine what the future will look like, and bring it to life by creating a futuristic world for their stories. Those futuristic designs help the story by showing the audience how the world needed or wanted to progress. Take a moment and think about a future you would like to see. What does it smell like? As you look around, what do you see? What does the food or even the air taste like? What are some inventions of the future? Design and describe the future that you see.
